Speaker: Scott Guiser

“Herbicides: The Good, Bad and The Ugly”

Scott Guiser was a Penn State extension educator and coordinated their Master Gardening program in Bucks County. He received his BS and MS in Horticulture from Penn State. He is currently on the faculty at the Barnes Foundation and an instructor in the Rutgers Continuing Education Program. He keeps honeybees, gardens and cooks for fun.

Herbicides are useful tools in the production and maintenance of landscape plants. In his presentation, he will explore how herbicides can be used safely. Also, he will identify herbicides that have the greatest potential to do harm and how to avoid plant injury. Special attention will be paid to rhododendrons, with respect to herbicide safety.

Speaker: Stephanie Cohen, “The Plant Diva”

Each year, the VF Chapter foregoes its April meeting and attends the GP ARS Banquet. The Greater Philadelphia Chapter Banquet will be held at a new location, the Sunnybrook Golf Club in Plymouth Meeting. This year’s speaker is Stephanie Cohen, “The Plant Diva.”

Stephanie Cohen is an award-winning horticulturist and author, a horticulture consultant, photographer, and writer. She has coauthored of 3 books: *The Perennial Gardener’s Design Primer* written with Nancy Ondra and published by Storey Press; *Fallscaping*, written with Nancy Ondra and photographer Rob Cardillo; and *The Nonstop Garden*, written with Jennifer Benner

By chance, Stephanie was asked to fill in at Temple University as an adjunct professor for a semester. More than 20 years later, she



retired after changing the face of horticulture at Temple. Stephanie helped establish the Landscape Arboretum of Temple University at Ambler and became its founding director.

She was recognized by the Perennial Plant Association as Educator of the Year in 2003. The PPA

has given her the Honor Award for Design and the Special Service Award. She also received the Garden Communicator of the Year Award for 2000 and 2001 by the American Nursery and Landscape Association. In 2014 she became a Garden Writers of America Fellow. She has lectured coast to coast, including Alaska. Stephanie has been on QVC TV as the “Perennial Diva.” She was featured on CN8 TV once a month on a gardening segment.

Rhododendron of the Year Plant Awards: 2018

Mid-Atlantic Region

Twenty-nine rhododendrons selected for their adaptability in eight regions of the United States have been awarded Rhododendron of the Year (ROY) honors for 2018. The purpose of the awards is to educate the public about the wide range of rhododendrons that can be grown successfully in gardens. To be selected for a ROY award a plant must have excellent foliage and flowers, have an attractive plant habit, prove itself cold and heat hardy for the specific region and be pest and disease resistant.

For each region, the Plant Award Committee has chosen four plants - an elepidote and a lepidote rhododendron, a deciduous azalea and an evergreen azalea.

The awards started in 2004. The awards for all years are posted at: [2018](#), [2017](#), [2016](#), [2015](#), [2014](#), [2013](#), [2012](#), [2011](#), [2010](#), [2009](#), [2008](#), [2007](#), [2006](#), [2005](#), [2004](#).

The Rhododendrons of the Year for all 8 regions are announced in the JARS each year. Those selected for the Mid-Atlantic Region in 2018 are:



Elepidote Rhododendron: 'Arthur Bedford'

(mauve seedling x *ponticum*) This large growing, vigorous rhododendron tolerates

exposure to full sun. Its funnel-shaped flowers with ruffled edges are pale mauve to lavender-blue with a distinctive dark blotch. This is a tall plant with good plant habit. Flowers are pale mauve with a brownish-red blotch, 3½" across, and fragrant. The dome-shaped trusses have 11 to 16 flowers. It blooms late midseason. Leaves are up to 6½" long, glossy, dark green with reddish-purple stems, and are retained 1 year. The plant develops the best plant habit when grown in full sun. Height: 6 ft. in 10 yrs. Plant is hardy to -5°F (-21°C). Selected by Lowinsky. Received the Award of Merit and the First-Class Certificate from the Royal Horticultural Society.



Lepidote Rhododendron: '24 Karat'

R. veitchianum cross. Flower inside and outside pale greenish yellow with deep greenish yellow spots and throat below dorsal lobe, funnel-shaped, 1½" across, minutely frilly margins. Flat truss has 8-10 flowers. Blooms early midseason. Leaves elliptic, acute apex, rounded base, 2" long, slightly convex, depressed midrib, moderate yellow green, retained 2 years. Grows to a typical height of 1 - 1½ ft. in 10 years. Intermediate plant habit. Plant and bud hardy to at least 0°F (-18°C). Hybridized by Haag.



Evergreen Azalea: 'Dreamsicle'

Flower strong pink inside and out, the interior with a white dorsal blotch and white markings at tips of all lobes, broadly funnel-shaped, wavy-edges, 2½" across. Inflorescence holds 2 to 4 flowers. Blooms midseason. Leaves elliptic, cuneate base, acute apex, flat, 1¾" long, semi-glossy, strong yellow green. Intermediate plant habit. Grows to a typical height of about 2 ft. in 10 years. Plant and bud hardy to at least 0°F (-18°C). Hybridized by McDonald.



Deciduous Azalea: *R. arborescens*

Flower white, often tinged pink, may have a yellow blotch, with reddish-purple style and stamens, tubular shaped, nicely fragrant trusses with 3-7 flowers. Blooms late to very late. Leaves ovate or obovate to elliptic, up to 4" long, glossy, deciduous. Tall shrub or small tree. Grows to 6 ft. tall in 10 years. Cold hardy to -15°F (-26°C). Native species found in the eastern United States from Pennsylvania to Georgia and westward to Alabama.

Philadelphia Flower Show



Members create mythical garden.

Rhododendrons and Florida are not a combination that readily comes to mind, but it will be the springboard for the Greater Philadelphia Chapter’s exhibit at the Philadelphia Flower Show the first week of March: “A Mythical Garden Along the Escambia River.”

To be sure, we’re not talking about elephant ears at Mar-a-Lago. Far west in the Florida Panhandle, between Pensacola and the Alabama state line, is a region replete with deciduous azaleas and water, making this indoor evocation an apt exhibit for the Flower Show’s overall theme, “The Wonders of Water.”

Numerous hybrids of species endemic to the area are part of the exhibit – ‘My Mary’, ‘High Tide’, ‘Kelsey’s Flame’ and more – along with dogwood, redbud, ferns, trillium and primula, placed along a little bit of stream, a sliver of the Escambia if you will.



Plant Labels are available for Chapter Members

In cooperation with Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens, plant labels are made for VF ARS members from January through March. If you have any questions, please contact Steve Wright (steve@jenkinsarboretum.org).

Eligibility: Labels will be made **only** for members and only for their **own use**. The sequence of orders processed will give priority to active members.

Description: The product is a permanent, laser-engraved, black anodized aluminum plant label. Each will measure $\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide by 3 inches long and will come with rounded corners and a pre-punched hole for hanging. Hanging wire is the responsibility of the member (small diameter bell wire is recommended).

Quantity: 120 labels maximum per order/member.

Cost: \$30.00 for 1 to 40 labels, \$50 for 41 to 80 labels, and \$70 for 81 to 120 labels. Checks should be made out to “Valley Forge Chapter, ARS”, and the money will be passed on to Jenkins.

Instructions for submitting: Create a document, preferably in Microsoft Word or similar program, that lists all plant tags to be made. Be sure to write the names *exactly* as you would like them to appear on the label – capitalization, spelling, quotes, etc. must be carefully reviewed before submission. Jenkins staff will review the document, recommend edits, and confirm those edits before any label-making will take place. For single-line labels, the list is simple. If double-line labels are

desired, simply put the second line in parentheses.

Single Line Examples:

- R. mucronulatum
- R. x ‘Hershey’s Red’
- ‘Koromo Shikibu’

Double Line Examples:

- R. fortunei (‘Lushan’)
- R. x ‘PJM’ (Weston Hybrid)
- ‘Anna Kehr’ (Kehr Hybrid)

Notes:

- 1) No line on a plant label can be longer than 26 characters (including spaces).
- 2) The format is yours, i.e., it may be ‘P.J.M.’ or just P.J.M. Plant names should not be abbreviated.

Checking label information: After you have prepared your list (as outlined above), thoroughly check and recheck using your own resources. As mentioned earlier, the Jenkins staff will thoroughly review and offer suggested modifications, but it would be very helpful to have someone else give your list a check ahead of time. It cannot be emphasized enough how important it is to check the labels for accuracy as they cannot be corrected once engraved. Inaccuracies may pass on false information on numerous occasions (plant sales, flower/truss shows, cuttings exchanges, garden tours).

Engraving label information: The final plant list should be emailed to Steve Wright at: steve@jenkinsarboretum.org, with ‘metal plant labels’ in the subject line.

Rhododendrons In America's Garden Capital

The 2019 ARS Convention will be at The Desmond Hotel in Malvern

The Greater Philadelphia, Lehigh Valley, Susquehanna Valley & Valley Forge Chapters of the ARS will host the 2019 Convention Thu. May 16 to Sun. May 19.

Karel Bernady and Steve Henning are Co-Chairs for the convention. The Desmond in Malvern is the convention hotel. The Desmond will host the main banquet and a second banquet will be held off site at the American Helicopter Museum which is about 10 minutes from The Desmond.

The convention hotel is The Desmond, a beautiful hotel nestled in the historic Chester County. The Desmond features deluxe 4-poster King Size beds. But, if you choose, you may have 2 Queen Size beds.

Until May 1, 2019, we have 80 rooms blocked out for 4 nights, Wednesday night through Saturday night, and 15 rooms blocked out for Tuesday night, at the

convention rate of \$149. Guests arriving on shoulder nights will be accommodated at the convention rate.

Tour itineraries are being planned, with a mix of outstanding public gardens including Chanticleer, Winterthur, Tyler Arboretum Jenkins Arboretum, Longwood, Morris Arboretum, and Mount Cuba, and fine private gardens of members. In addition, a plant sale, breeders' roundtable, a truss show and photo competition are envisioned.

Closer to the convention, many more members will be needed to carry out a variety of duties – tour docents, plant sales, goodie-bag stuffing, staffing the registration table and more.

Dinner followed by a program will be at the [American Helicopter Museum](#) that evening. There will be a shuttle to and from the hotel and the American Helicopter Museum.
